

Critical Thinking Question Framework

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This framework is designed to help leaders facilitate thoughtful, engaging discussions within their teams. By using these open-ended questions, you can encourage critical thinking, uncover new perspectives, and drive better decision-making.

How to Use This Framework

1. Prepare Ahead: Review the questions before meetings to identify which are most relevant to the discussion.
2. Adapt as Needed: Tailor the questions to fit your team's unique context and goals.
3. Encourage Participation: Create a safe space for all team members to contribute their thoughts.
4. Follow Up: Use the "Reflecting and Learning" section to revisit decisions and improve future discussions.

1. Exploring the Problem

- What is the root cause of this issue?
- How do we know this is the real problem and not a symptom of something larger?
- What evidence supports our understanding of this issue?
- Are there any assumptions we're making about the problem? If so, what are they?

2. Generating Ideas and Solutions

- What are all the possible solutions, no matter how unconventional they seem?
- What is the most optimistic outcome we could aim for? The most realistic?
- How could we approach this differently than we have in the past?
- What would an outsider suggest we do?

3. Evaluating Options and Risks

- What are the potential risks of each solution?
- Which option aligns best with our goals and values?
- What would happen if we do nothing?
- Are we prioritizing speed over quality, or vice versa? Why?

4. Considering Different Perspectives

- Who else could be impacted by this decision, and how?
- How might someone with a different perspective view this situation?
- What are the counterarguments to this approach?
- Have we listened to the quietest voices in the room?

5. Reflecting and Learning

- What worked well during this discussion or decision-making process?
- What could we do differently next time to improve?
- What have we learned from similar situations in the past?
- How will we measure the success of this decision?

6. Supporting a Culture of Critical Thinking

- Are we creating an environment where everyone feels safe to challenge ideas?
- How can we encourage more open dialogue and constructive debates?
- What tools or skills could help us improve our critical thinking as a team?
- Are there any biases we should be aware of that might influence our thinking?
