1. Exploring the Problem

2. Generating Ideas and Solutions

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3. Evaluating Options and Risks
What are the potential risks of each solution?
☐ Which option aligns best with our goals and values?
☐ What would happen if we do nothing?
Are we prioritizing speed over quality, or vice versa? Why?
4. Considering Different Perspectives
Who else could be impacted by this decision, and how?
☐ How might someone with a different perspective view this situation?
☐ What are the counterarguments to this approach?
☐ Have we listened to the quietest voices in the room?
5. Reflecting and Learning
☐ What worked well during this discussion or decision-making process?
☐ What could we do differently next time to improve?
☐ What have we learned from similar situations in the past?
☐ How will we measure the success of this decision?
6. Supporting a Culture of Critical Thinking
Are we creating an environment where everyone feels safe to challenge ideas?
☐ How can we encourage more open dialogue and constructive debates?
☐ What tools or skills could help us improve our critical thinking as a team?
